It has been an amazing year for HUFH as we adjust our focus to increase our impact, moving from volunteer mission based programs to more focused and targeted programs led by our Haitian colleagues. Stephanie Saler Korn



Stephanie is a doer. Following a career as a teacher and time at home devoted to raising her children, Stephanie returned to school and graduated from Pace University with a Bachelors of Nursing in 2014. She is currently a registered nurse at New York-Presbyterian Hospital in pediatrics. Stephanie graduated from Barnard College in 1998 and taught at The Brearley School for five years while attending Bank Street College of Education (2000).

Stephanie became interested in Global Health through Hands Up For Haiti. She joined her first team in 2012 and has been on multiple pediatric missions. She feels passionately about her work in Haiti and is committed to helping the Northern Haitian community. She joined the Hands Up for Haiti Board of Directors in 2016.

Stephanie is now working on Hands Up for Haiti's new Hypertension Screen and Treat Program, hoping to provide long-term care for adult Haitian patients. Through her hard work, the first site launched this past October and Stephanie will be returning to Haiti next month to support the launch of the second site.

Stephanie has expressed her hopes and dreams for program and says about its launch: "After countless meetings reviewing the protocol and plans for opening the first clinic, it was amazing to see patients lining up in Dondon, excited to be a part of our Hypertension program. This program is so meaningful because it truly embodies the meaning of sustainable healthcare in Haiti, and empowers our local Haitian staff to maintain the program and care for patients. On our initial visit, we saw blood pressures that in the United States would cause patients to be rushed to the Emergency Room. But in these remote villages, our Hypertension program is a patient's only access to care. At home I work in pediatrics, but in Haiti I see so many older adults that have lived a hard life without any of the comforts we are used to at home. In fact, only four of forty patients could sign their name on their patient contract. Thirty-six patients signed their name with an "X". These older adults deserve to grow old while receiving basic medical care and I am passionate about making that happen."

Stephanie and her husband Steve live in Tarrytown with their three daughters, Sarah, 13, Sydney, 11 and Sutton, 8.

Nurse of the Year.

Judy is a registered nurse whose entire career has been devoted to children, mothers and maternal-child nursing. Judy holds certifications in childbirth education and perinatal bereavement counseling, and is an internationally board certified lactation consultant as well as a Lamaze instructor. Over the course of her more than 40-year career, Judy worked at New Milford Hospital, the Danbury VNA and Center for Pediatric Medicine and most recently as a Patient Care Manager in the CareMount Medical pediatrics practice. In 2014, Hudson Valley Magazine honored her as the

Judy is an active community volunteer, including manning the hotline at a battered woman's shelter and actively working on community projects through her church. Judy has always been interested in global health and she is passionate about infant and child nutrition, breastfeeding, and sexual assault and domestic violence prevention issues.

Judy spearheaded HUFH's efforts to establish a partnership with Haiti's nursing schools, providing the Haitian students with increased and enhanced educational opportunities while at the same time promoting global health education for medical professionals training in the US. Judy's work promoting breastfeeding and teaching Helping Babies Breathe, newborn resuscitation skills for traditional birth attendants, has directly and positively impacted newborn survival and maternal health in Haiti.

Judy and her husband Jim have lived in Danbury for 29 years, where they raised their three devoted children, Tim, Brendan and Erin. They recently welcomed their new grandson, Archie Patrick, born January 14, 2017.



Lynn Perton



Lynn has always had a passion for helping people and for motivating individuals and families to eat well and play hard. She received her Bachelor of Science in Community Nutrition from Penn State University. She did her dietetic internship at Peter Bent Brigham Hospital, an affiliate of Harvard University, and became a registered dietitian and later earned a Master of Arts in Health Education from Teachers College/Columbia University.

Lynn worked at the NYS Department of Health for nearly 27 years, where she was a Nutrition Program Director managing large state and federal nutrition programs in the downstate region of New York. Prior to that, Lynn spent a few years working in community health centers in the Boston area, followed by a short stint at Roosevelt Hospital Pediatric Ambulatory Care unit in New York City. Since retiring in 2012, Lynn consults with Hudson River HealthCare community health centers and volunteers with the Make a Wish Foundation as a Wish Greeter.

Lynn discovered Hands Up For Haiti through her dear friend Celeste Theis. She took her first volunteer trip in 2013 and returns annually, serving as a co-trip leader for the past two years.

From the beginning, Lynn focused on nutrition. In most of the villages where HUFH works, there is no electrical grid, refrigeration, stoves, or potable water. Motivated by the high incidence of malnutrition, Lynn took action and created a simple, culturally relevant, nutrition education lesson targeted at youths and began to explore starting community gardens. She also worked to get quality, evidence-based prenatal and pediatric tools laminated and bound for HUFH nurses. More recently, she is working to standardize our malnutrition program by obtaining for each site accurate and high quality measuring devices to chart progress in growth and program success in general.

Lynn loves to travel with her husband Kerry and daughter Danielle. In her free time she loves to bake sourdough bread.




Patrick Schelle


WHEREAS: during her most recent trip Lynn was able to see evidence of her and her teams' efforts in the increased number of happy and healthy babies and children,



Haiti Facts and Figures

Haiti Facts & Figures

- Life expectancy is 63 years
- 30% of the population is considered food insecure
- 75% of the rural population lives in poverty on less than \$2 per day and do not have access to medical care
- 1 in 5 children suffers from malnutrition
- Infant mortality: 60 per 1000 births
- For every 1000 babies born live in Haiti, 59 more will die before reaching their first birthday and 88 will not live past age 5 years
- An estimated 1 in 285 births will result in a woman's death, a ratio about 16 times higher than in the United States
- About 1500 preventable deaths from cervical cancer yearly, 50 times higher than in the US
- More than 500,000 Haitians, about 5% of the population, are legally blind; more than 80,000 have no light perception at all
- Waterborne illnesses, such as typhoid, cholera, and chronic diarrhea, account for more than 50% of deaths in Haiti every year



Saving Mothers - Saving Children

Hands Up for Haiti's prenatal clinics, Helping Babies Survive programs, maternity center support and postnatal care programs together help ensure safe births for both mother and child in Haiti.

Helping Babies Survive (HBS), developed by the American Academy of Pediatrics, is a suite of hands-on training programs intended to reduce neonatal mortality in resource-limited environments and save lives.

Helping Babies Breathe (HBB) trains birth attendants in newborn resuscitation skills to be used during the "Golden Minute" immediately after a baby is born to give a much better chance at life to babies who struggle to breathe at birth, and also to train doctors and nurses to be teachers in their own country.



To date, we have trained more than 300 matrones and medical providers in this lifesaving technique and 116 professionals as instructors in their own country. Just last month, in an empowering moment, our in-country team, who we had trained earlier, traveled from Cap Haitien to Port au Prince to in turn teach the course to 24 Haitian nurse practitioner students.

Essential Care for Every Baby (ECEB) teaches health care providers essential practices to keep all babies healthy in the first 48 hours after birth. Through hands-on learning and practice, the course focuses on how to recognize danger signs in newborns and on improving success in practices such as breast feeding, cord care and eye care.



Saving Mothers - Saving Children



Prenatal Outreach: Our community outreach efforts are run by nurses and community health workers who see women on a monthly basis in their local villages, where they screen them for diabetes and hypertension, provide treatment as needed, and ensure they have a safe birth plan.

Postnatal Care: We see all newborn babies and mothers in our clinics for a postnatal visit within a week to ensure that the babies are gaining weight, breastfeeding well, and to assess for any problems. We enroll our babies in follow-up programs to ensure that they get necessary immunizations.

HUFH training workshops and maternal and postnatal care programs literally save hundreds of babies' lives in Haiti. Donations will help us continue to grow these programs. There are few ways to make your donation matter more.



Unacceptable maternal and infant mortality rates in Haiti:

More women die during childbirth in Haiti than in any other country in the Western Hemisphere. And for every 1,000 births, 60 babies will die in the first month of life; of those: half will die directly after birth, usually from infection, lack of oxygen or prematurity. Others suffer brain damage and are permanently impaired.



In Haiti, three out of four babies are delivered by traditional birth attendants - matrones as they are called in Haiti. HBS trains these unskilled workers in simple resuscitation skills that save babies' lives and prevent brain damage.

Hypertension Screen & Treat

Through our new hypertension initiative, we are training local nurses and other health care providers to recognize and treat severe and unrecognized hypertension, lowering the risk of stroke, heart failure, glaucoma and premature death.

Medical professionals here and in Haiti collaborated to formulate a simple, easy-to-follow protocol for local health care providers to **screen for hypertension**; to ensure **proper treatment**, HUFH also provides them with a supply of prepackaged, safe and inexpensive medications. Our pilot program is being supervised by a Haitian nurse practitioner; as such, it truly embodies the meaning of sustainable healthcare in Haiti, and empowers our local Haitian staff to maintain the program and care for patients.

The compliance rate in the new program is inspiring: 95% of the patients enrolled in October remain in the program, come to their regular appointments and are on the correct medications, with positive results. Our second site, also in a community with high acuity, will launch in May. We hope to launch a new clinic site every six to twelve months.

As each new patient was registered in the program, they were asked why they wanted to participate in the program. Many spoke about wanting to improve their health and have access to medication. One patient, though, Ms. C.J.D., spoke of being alone, knowing that she needed medical attention. In these remote villages, our hypertension screen and treat program is a patient's only access to care. When we told Ms. C.J.D. that our nurse practitioner would be there for these patients every month without fail, her infectious smile was a sign that this program is truly needed.



Hypertension Screen & Treat

The hypertension screen and treat program is desperately needed. Our goal is to open another clinic site every 6-12 months while continuing to care for our current patients, but we can do so only if our fundraising exceeds the needs of existing clinics. Donations will help us grow this program and directly save lives.



Haiti ranks 168 out of 187 on the 2014 Human Development Index. Life expectancy in Haiti is only 63 years; 75% of the rural population lives in poverty on less than \$2 per day and do not have access to medical care. Severe and unrecognized hypertension contributes to high levels of stroke, heart failure and premature death.



How Your Donations Help



Shada Low-Cost Community Clinic: serves 25,000 people in the most impoverished area in Cap Haitien; 300-400 patients each month, half infants and children; home to malnutrition, prenatal and maternal health programs.

Annual budget \$22000, less than \$1900/month. Average cost per patient: \$6

Fighting Malnutrition - Medika Mamba Program: treats 600 children each year who are severely malnourished. Education spreads through the community, lowering the malnutrition rate for entire villages.

Annual budget \$58000. Average cost per child: \$96

Clean Water Program: each water well provides access to fresh and clean water for approximately 4000 people for more than 35 years, in turn preventing waterborne disease, including cholera. Community education ensures water safety and well maintenance. Wells built to date: 8.

Annual budget \$14000. Average cost per well to build, maintain and educate: \$3500.

Helping Babies Survive: reduces Haiti's infant and maternal mortality rates, the highest in the Western Hemisphere, by training traditional birth attendants in newborn resuscitation skills and in how to recognize danger signs in the first 48 hours after birth, and by teaching local medical professionals to be teachers.

Annual budget \$8000. Trained to date 300 traditional birth attendants; 200 medical professionals

Follow Up and Surgical Care: covers the medical and surgical costs for children with life-threatening illnesses; approximately 20 each year need hospital care and 15 need surgery.

Annual budget \$8000. \$400 pays for the average emergency surgery a child needs.

How Your Donations Help

Saving Vision: provides vision saving screening, treatment and surgeries for 200 patients each year, including surgery and consults, in a region with few ophthalmologists, and provides advanced training to local providers.

Annual budget \$8000. Cost for cataract surgery: \$75; cost for glaucoma consult: \$25; cost for simple consult: \$5

Cervical Cancer See and Treat: addresses the 1500 annual preventable death among Haitian women by providing education, low-cost screening and immediate treatment for about 3000 women annually.

Annual budget \$30000. Cost to screen and treat each woman: \$10

Hypertension Screen and Treat: to combat the often fatal public health effects of severe and unrecognized hypertension, trains local health care providers in a simple easy-to-use protocol and provides the necessary supplies and medications.

Annual budget per program site \$2000. Cost per screen and treat: \$30

Nursing Education: provides education and supplies to entire classes of nursing students, who in turn become care givers in remote communities.

Annual budget \$4800.



Fighting Malnutrition

Hands Up for Haiti's Medika Mamba program treats 600 children each year who are severely malnourished as we reach out to more children in remote communities.

Medika Mamba Program: HUFH runs active malnutrition programs at four sites. Our Haitian physicians and nurses identify children who are moderately or severely malnourished and follow these children weekly, providing them with daily supplements of a high calorie peanut based supplement called Medika Mamba. Our program treats 600 severely malnourished children each year, but the need is much greater. Even as the children of one community grow healthier as the program succeeds, outreach is identifying more and more malnourished children from other remote communities that suffer from severe food shortages. We hope to expand the number of sites, the number of children we treat, and the number of families we educate about nutrition, in 2017.

Nutrition Education: Families are critical partners in HUFH's efforts to fight malnutrition. We educate families about appropriate nutrition and teach them how to prepare healthy food with clean water. This education spreads through the community, touching many more lives.

Professional Education And Program

Equipment: Ensuring that our Haitian medical staff has both the training and adequate equipment for our programs is a critical part of what we do. Our malnutrition program requires our Haitian staff to have a full understanding of both the causes and treatment of moderate and severe malnutrition. In addition, they must have

accurate measurement tools to do the weekly assessments for all the children in the program. Training sessions are held with our staff to review protocols and current guidelines. And with help from partners such as SECA, we are working to make certain that each malnutrition center has working accurate scales and height measurement tools. To ensure that each child is progressing properly, our medical director reviews all the children regularly.

Malnutrition, a preventable and curable disease, affects one in five children in Haiti. Whether it is moderate or severe, this condition makes children more susceptible to infections and prevents normal growth and mental development. Hands Up for Haiti is working with the global community to eradicate childhood malnutrition. Using a treat and teach approach, we are taking aim at this deadly disease.



Clean Water Project

Water equals life. And clean water equals health. Our Clean Water Program provides entire communities with access to clean water for their residents.



Recognizing that much of the disease that we treat in Haiti would be prevented by the availability of clean water, HUFH has made clean water one of our priorities in the communities that we serve with a two-prong program: **construction and education**.

Building wells and making certain that the water wells we have built remain in good working condition is a priority. Working with the community from the start, HUFH has an ongoing program to raise funds to build and maintain community wells throughout northern Haiti in villages identified by our partners in Haiti, Dr. Eugene Maklin and Dr. Ernest Jasmin, the Director of the Ministry

of Health in the north. Each water well provides about 4000 people with access to fresh, clean water for more than 35 years and provides employment for the



Haitian workers who build them. This is a guarantee of healthier children and families whose lives are made easier and safer. To date, we have built eight wells, repaired two existing wells, and more are in progress.

Water safety education: As each new well is built, we also deliver community education programs on waterborne disease and cholera prevention, the importance of clean water for health, and water safety and well maintenance measures. Working with our in-country

community liaison, we developed visual learning materials including a video called 'The Story of Cholera,' laminated images that illustrate properly storing clean water, maintaining the environment in which the well is situated, when and how to wash hands, and how surface water trickles down through the soil to become clean naturally filtered ground water. Although these wells are built with donated funds as a gift to the communities they serve, they will only be a success if the community embraces that gift as its own and works together to maintain the wells in good condition and cherish them. Education helps ensure this.



HUFH's clean water project is a guarantee not just that lives are made easier and safer, but of healthier children and families. Donations will help us build and maintain more wells in more communities providing families with water, essential to life.

Haiti is the poorest country in the Western hemisphere. 1/4 of Haiti's population lives in extreme poverty. Many communities lack access to clean water and adequate sanitation, and they struggle to fight pollution.

Waterborne bacteria cause infectious diarrhea and life threatening cholera and are a direct result of people forced to drink unclean water to survive. Yet many Haitian communities lack water wells, and the need for clean water is urgent.
