#### Dear Karen and Jay,

**Heal - Teach - Support**. Hurricane Matthew received lots of media attention but days of torrential rains and flooding in the north region, in Cap Haitien and other communities where HUFH works, went unreported. These relentless rains caused death and serious property damage, further weakened the already weak infrastructure and compounded the difficulties the north was facing after the hurricane. This time, our HUFH clinics were affected, but our staff responded quickly and worked tirelessly to clean up and get things up and running within days.

The people of Haiti are resilient: they can deal with multiple challenges when they have the proper resources. This newsletter details how, with the generous support of our donors and volunteers, HUFH is helping to provide those tools by collaborating with the Haitian medical community to create and support a sustainable health care program in the north, one ready to deal with any challenge, at any time.

## HUFH Clinics at Shada and Bod me Limbe

HUFH supports two established clinics in the north, one in Shada, the most impoverished area of Cap Haitien, and the other at Haiti Village Health in Bod me Limbe, a rural fishing village in the coastal region of Bas Limbe. These clinics are staffed year-round by Haitian doctors, nurses and community health workers, who are directly supported by HUFH donors. In addition to providing direct care for children, pregnant women and other adults, our goals are to improve maternal and neonatal outcomes, promote breastfeeding, identify and treat malnutrition, and identify and treat preventable diseases in adults. HUFH supports the clinics with medical supplies, medications, and laboratory equipment, and our visiting teams provide additional support, working side-by-side with clinic staff.

### New Program: Cervical Cancer See and Treat Program



Cervical cancer is the leading cause of cancer deaths in women in Haiti with an estimated 1,500 **preventable** deaths each year, the highest reported incidence of cervical cancer of any country in the world, 50 times higher than the rate in the United States, where Pap tests and the widely available HPV vaccine dramatically decreased cervical cancer mortality. Women in Haiti have not benefited from Pap test screening due to lack of health care infrastructure and trained pathologists; there are only four pathologists in this country of 10 million people. As a consequence, most women in Haiti have never been screened for cervical cancer. And the vaccine is only being offered in limited trials.

To help change this reality, Hands Up for Haiti, under the leadership of Dr. Nelly Osias, an OB-GYN in Haiti, and Dr. Liza Lizaragga, an OB-GYN from the US, launched a new See and Treat Program to screen women and treat those who need it immediately. We are proud to announce that we opened our first "see & treat" clinic in Limbe, a town on the outskirts of Cap Haitien, headed by Dr. Osias. In just the first weeks since the clinic opened, the clinic has already screened scores of women.

We expect to screen 3000 women this year and treat 300 **before** it is too late - preventing their premature and unnecessary deaths.

### NEW PROGRAM: Hypertension Screen and Treat Program

Severe and unrecognized hypertension in Haiti contributes to high levels of stroke, heart failure and premature death. Through HUFH's hypertension initiative, we are training local nurses and other health care providers with a simple, easy-to-follow protocol and a ready supply of prepackaged, safe and inexpensive medications.

Our pilot program is being supervised by Wisly Lindor, a Haitian nurse practitioner. After many back and forth emails with HUFH medical professionals in the US, Wisly pre-screened and selected the pilot group. Wisley will continue to see his patients

monthly, using the protocol that we set together. He will remain in contact with nurses and doctors in the US who will help him monitor those patients, and our visiting teams will work with him when they are on the ground.

HUFH's mission goes beyond educating medical professionals: as part of this program, US program leaders Dr. Marilyn Jacobowitz and Stephanie Korn held an educational session with the community, explaining the disease and the program, all in an effort to help our patients assume responsibility for their personal health.



Based on the screening blood pressures of hundreds of patients, this program is desperately needed. Patients were enthusiastic about the program and eager to participate. Prior to the program launch, these patients had never been treated for hypertension.
